



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

Monday, April 4 - May 9

Cinematic Exploration: Hope, Despair and Perseverance

10 - Noon Class Fee \$55 This class will explore three fundamental feelings and emotions that we often experience when confronted by life crises, unexpected events and developments, and dramatic situations. The films selected were chosen to reflect how we handle these emotions differently based on character, life exposures, environment and cultural background. The emphasis of the class highlights the cultural conditioning that determines our perceptions of reactions to and behaviors displayed under various life circumstances. The characters in the films will not only open up opportunities for us to discuss the theme of the films and delve into the human behaviors, but also allows for us to share unique personal stories.

Science Fiction Cinema: Part Two Fact or Fiction

6 meetings 1 - 3 pm Class Fee \$55 In this second of this three-part course, we will take a deeper dive into such concepts as shapeshifting, monster physiology and how to design your own movie. The science of some of your favorite Sci Fi Films will be dicussed and analyzed to better understand the relevant overt and covert science that separates fact from fiction. including the relevancy of the film laboratories where the work is done, and the verismillitude of what is seen in these films.

Mark Glassy, Ph.D. is a Visiting Scholar in the Translational Neuro-Oncology Laboratory of the UCSD Moores Cancer Center. He is the founder and chairman of Nascent Biotech, Inc., a member of the Advisory Board of the UCR School of Medicine. Dr. Glassy is the inventor of Pritumumab, the first human antibody used to treat a cancer patient, and the recipient of the 2003 Arthur Furst Award for outstanding research advancing science for the betterment of humanity. 6 meetings 10 - Noon Class Fee \$55 This 6-week introductory level course is a hands-on printmaking class where the instructor will demonstrate (via Zoom) how to create beautiful relief prints using traditional and not-so traditional methods. All printing methods shown are demonstrated without the use of a printing press and therefore can be created at home. The course covers techniques used in cutting and creating prints from wood blocks, linoleum blocks, and the reductive printmaking method. Instructor will begin each class with a brief discussion of the printing making method followed by a demonstration and group participation. Assignments with instructions will be sent out weekly to participants so you can develop work during the week. 6 meetings *no mtg. 5/30 10 - Noon Class Fee \$55 An overview of Albert Einstein's life and his contribution to physics and cosmology. We will review Einstein's education, and the social and political conditions in Europe in the early 1900s. Einstein's revolutionary theories in physics, specifically the special and general theories of relativity, will be discussed including a look at his personal life, religious and political ideas.

We'll recreate it these uniquely styled 'patterns' by first drawing them with pencil on graph paper, transferring into ink patterns and finally painting them in either the original manuscript colors or colors of your choice. Iran Contra: The Gift That Keeps On Giving

6 meetings 1 - 3pm Class Fee \$55 In fall of 1986, the covert and illegal enterprise of supplying arms to an insurgency in Central America and to the Iranian government in its war with Iraq burst out of its classified vaults on to the headlines of global media. The Reagan administration went into full cover-up mode in order to protect the president, who had been ardently directing these policies. In this course, you will journey from the early events that laid the groundwork for the deceitful endeavor through to the ignominious conclusion six years later when another president, himself a participant, pardoned the conspirators. You will discover how the seeds of war planted in the 1980s now yield a harvest of poisonous fruit that threatens global security. The course will incorporate lecture, discussion, and historic photos and videos.

John Powers, M.F.A., is a writer and director with experience in theater and film. Drawing on recent U.S. history as source material for a number of his productions, he has also developed this material into provocative classroom engagements, such as Nixon and the Pentagon Papers, 1968: The Year That Rocked, and Pearl Harbor Reconsidered. Lessons From the Weimer: The Rise and Fall of a Democratic Republic

From 1918-1933, it was the German Reich, the German Republic, the Weimer, Germany's first democracy. Following a failed war, military insurrection, the abdication of a monarch, and a national revolution, the fledgling government was born of necessity. In much of its early years, it faced food shortages, labor strikes, civil disobedience, hyperinflation, and the payment of insurmountable foreign financial reparations. It served a humiliated, angry, politically, and economically divided society. However, it did have its own Golden Age. Arguably, Germany, and Berlin itself, became the cultural and artistic center of Europe if not the world. Economic prosperity, leisure, and the outward expression of individual freedom were evident. Yet still, it collapsed. This course will explore Weimer Germany and the reasons for its rise and fall. There are lessons here to be learned. Lessons for contemporary democratic societies to take seriously.

Stephen G. Harding. Since his undergraduate days at UCLA, Steve has been an avid student of 19th and early 20th century political, socio-economic, geographic, and cultural history. His academic areas of interest include comparative politics, political socialization, as well as local, national, and international systems of governance. UCR Osher instructor since 2016.



George E. Haggerty, Distinguished Professor of English Emeritus at the University of California, Riverside will discuss the life and letters of Horace Walpole, the son of England's first Prime Minister, and the author of England's first Gothic novel: The Castle of Otranto.



George E. Haggerty, is a Distinguished Professor of English Emeritus at the University of California, Riverside. His books include Gothic Fiction/Gothic Form (1989); Unnatural Affections: Women and Fiction in the Later Eighteenth Century (1998); Men In Love: Masculinity and Sexuality in the Eighteenth Century (1999); Queer Gothic (2006); Horace Walpole's Letters: Masculinity and Friendship in the Eighteenth-Century (2011); and Queer Friendship: Male Intimacy in the English Literary Tradition (2018). He has also edited (with Bonnie Zimmerman) Professions of Desire: Lesbian and Gay Studies in Literature (1995); Gay Histories and Cultures: An Encyclopedia (2000), Music and Sexuality in Britten: Selected Essays of Philip Brett (2006), and (with Molly McGarry) The Blackwell Companion to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer Studies(2007). He is currently at work on Horace Walpole: A Life in Letters.

The Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professorship Award is presented yearly to three retired UCR faculty to support their work on compelling projects in teaching, research, or public service activities. Edward A. Dickson served as a Regent of the University of California from 1913-1946, the longest tenure of any Regent.

In 1955 Mr. Dickson presented the University with an endowment to provide for annual special professorships for retired faculty. In 2003 the funds for the Dickson award were separated into ten endowments, one dedicated to each campus.

On the UCR campus, award oversight and evaluation is performed by the UCR Academic Senate Committee on Faculty Welfare, whose membership includes active and retired faculty. The Committee evaluates the merit and significance of the proposals and the nominees' previous contributions in the areas of teaching, research and service. Each emeritus/a professor receiving support from the Dickson endowment is known as an Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professor for the duration of the award


