The New York Melting Pot: 1880-1940

The term melting pot originated in 1908 by Isreal Zangwill. At first, it was used as a metaphor to define the union of several cultures, ethnicities, and nationalities. The opportunities for such unions in New York attracted massive amounts of immigrants to the United States. In fact, immigration to New York was at an all-time high in 1910 when 41% of New Yorkers were immigrants when several ethnic groups from Eastern and Southern Europe were migrating to the United States. Where did they settle? What did they bring? How did they mix (or not)? What do we have to thank each group for in today's culture? Using archival footage and videos, take a trip through the multiple entry ports to New York, and see the world through the eyes of an immigrant of the last century.

Dr. Glassy is the inventor of Pritumumab, the first human antibody used to treat a cancer patient, and the recipient of the 2003 Arthur Furst Award for outstanding research advancing science for the betterment of humanity. The Literature of AIDS: Gay Men Respond to a Crisis

This class explores the literary response to the AIDS crisis as it emerged in gay American culture in the 1980s and 1990s. You will read and contemplate the literary and political/culture effect of memoirs, novels, plays, poetry and essays. The course will have an historical emphasis, but it will also spend some time considering the status of the literary response to AIDS in the twenty-first century as well.

George E. Haggerty, is a Distinguished Professor of English Emeritus at the University of California, Riverside. His books include *Gothic Fiction/Gothic Form* (1989); *Unnatural Affections: Women and Fiction in the Later Eighteenth Century* (1998); *Men In Love: Masculinity and Sexuality in the Eighteenth Century* (1999); *Queer Gothic* (2006); *Horace Walpole's Letters: Masculinity and Friendship in the Eighteenth-Century* (2011); and *Queer Friendship: Male Intimacy in the English Literary Tradition* (2018). He has also edited (with Bonnie Zimmerman) *Professions of Desire: Lesbian and Gay Studies in Literature* (1995); *Gay Histories and Cultures: An Encyclopedia* (2000), *Music and Sexuality in Britten: Selected Essays of Philip Brett* (2006), and (with Molly McGarry) *The Blackwell Companion to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer Studies*(2007). He is currently at work on *Horace Walpole: A Life in Letters*.

The History of American Cinema

This course will explore the development of America’s motion picture industry from the pre-cinema era to the introduction of sound in commercial film. The course is a history survey and will include a discussion of the inventions that made movies possible, how the concept of watching pictures “move” became understood and accepted, the early pioneers in film in the US and Europe, the establishment of the studios in Hollywood, and the influence of movies on the Industrial Age’s new middle class. The intended audience will be those interested in the early years of motion pictures, but the class should also appeal to anyone attracted to American history of the early 20th century, its Industrial Revolution and the social and cultural upheaval associated with the rise of urbanism and mass consumption.

Craig Ewing was a city planner for over 30 years and has led lectures for planning conferences. A fan of classic movies for many years, Craig formed the Palm Springs Classic Movies Fan Club. Yet, whether the U.S. has been exceptional in all of its years can be debated. Military Technology, Development, and How “The Sausage” is Made

The subject of military technology is mostly a black hole of unknown and unknowable confusing facts, confounding terminology, and runaway costs. The added confusion of tactical and strategic objectives and secrecy even further contributes to our doubts about the necessity of military spending. In this course we will attempt share a bigger picture of the military’s role in the strategy of diplomacy, military strategy, and defense of the Nation. The Star Wars (Strategic Defense Initiative) program was considered a technological failure, but a stronger case can be made for it as strategic master stroke. We will discuss how programs are funded, mismanaged, saved from cancellation, and some that are just too big to fail. Also covered satellite technology, high energy lasers, tank development, aircraft evolution, and test ranges. Stories, anecdotes, rumors, and legends will be discussed.

Howard S. Friedman, Ph.D.
Distinguished Professor of the Graduate Division &
Distinguished Professor of Psychology Emeritus
University of California, Riverside



For his work on “changing how we think about the nature of health,” Dr. Friedman received the **McKeen Cattell Award** from the Association for Psychological Science, a career award for applied scientific research. His research on disease-prone and self-healing personalities (terms he coined) led to the Outstanding Contributions to Health Psychology award from the American Psychological Association. A UCR professor since the days of Chancellor Ivan Hinderaker, Professor Friedman has also received UCR’s Distinguished Teaching Award, and the national **Elizabeth Hurlock Beckman Award**, for “inspiring students to make a difference in the community.”

Why do some people thrive well into old age while others become ill or die young? Our studies of the lifetime pathways of 1500 Americans who were initially assessed as children in 1921 suggest a conceptual shift in how we think about health. As current events have made starkly clear, health is much more than the absence of diagnosed disease.

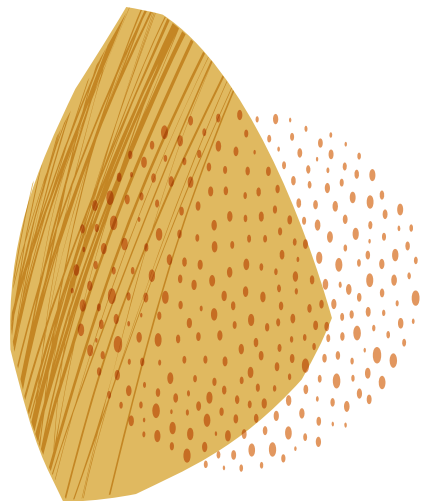
