

Wednesdays The LA Zoot Suit Riots of 1943

The Zoot Suit Riots were a series of conflicts in June 1943 in Los Angeles which pitted American servicemen stationed in Los Angeles against young black and young Mexican-American city residents. American servicemen and white Angelenos attacked and stripped children, teenagers, and youths who wore zoot suits, ostensibly because they considered the outfits, which were made from large amounts of fabric, to be unpatriotic during World War II. But what else may have really caused this largely forgotten event in our history?

6 meetings (No class January 15, February 19) 10 - Noon Class Fee \$55 What issues are raised by campus reaction to the Israel-Gaza war? What is the status of academic freedom and faculty governance? What are the limitations on campus speech and protest? What will be the impact of new government restrictions on curriculum, DEI offices and affirmative action? What will be the impact of efforts to create new conservative colleges within existing universities? Are elite colleges worth the cost? And other issues.

Lewis Collens is President and Professor of Law Emeritus, Illinois Institute of Technology (IIT). He served as the university's seventh president from 1990 to 2007 and as Dean of IIT's Chicago-Kent College of Law from 1974 to 1990. He is currently Chairman of the Executive Committee of Advance Illinois, a Trustee of The Civic Federation where he chairs the Kearney Center for Public Pensions. He also serves as a member of the boards of WTTW, Rush University, Tawani Foundation, Newberry Library and the J.B. and M.K. Pritzker Family Foundation.

Airpower Diplomacy: The Cold War to Today

6 meetings 10 - Noon Class Fee \$55 This course will discuss the concept of airpower diplomacy and airpower coercion as a tool by which nation states express their interest and project power in operations other than conventional war. It will include discussions on how airpower was used during the Cold War (1947 – 1991) for intelligence gathering, coercive diplomacy, power projection, and humanitarian assistance. Parallels will be drawn between the applications of airpower during the Cold War and post-Cold War, including in current international affairs.

Gary Gomez has over 2,000 hours as a pilot in the F-4S Phantom, F-14A Tomcat, and TA-4J Skyhawk. He has also logged 279 aircraft carrier arrested landings. He has operational flying experience in the Indo-Pacific Command including operations in South Korea and Japan, as well as aircraft carrier based operations in North Africa, Israel, the Mediterranean Sea, and the Persian Gulf. Gary is a combat decorated naval aviator, having flown numerous combat missions during Operation Desert Storm. Osher instructor since 2023.

Explore the Pacific Northwest foods that pair well with Washington State wines. We will review the 4-Step Wine Tasting Method (Look, Smell, Taste, and Conclude) along with the 6-Major Wine Traits (Alcohol, Acid, Sweetness, Tannin, Body, and Carbonation) to aid in your wine tasting adventures. This wine tasting class will introduce you to the excellent grapes, wines, and foods of Washington State.

Robert N Kretzmer is a Chevaliers Tastevin of the Confrere des Chavaliers de Tastevin at the Clos de Vouget (Burgundy, France); member of the International Wine and Food Society; and, member of the Sommelier Society (Washington, DC). Robert's family roots trace back to Alsace, France, which is known for extraordinary white wines. Robert has studied wine, grapes, winemaking, and wine terroir for more than 50 years. He has harvested grapes in California, France, Italy, Oregon, Washington, and Virginia. He has had private tours of vineyards in the United States and Europe. Beauty & the Beast: Variations on a Theme

This ambitious course will explore various depictions of the beauty and the beast theme as found in the following six films: **Beauty and the Beast** (1946), **The Hunchback of Notre Dame** (1939), **The Elephant Man** (1980), **Othello** (1955) **A Streetcar Named Desire** (1951), and **The Shape of Water** (2017). As we deconstruct the characters and unravel the poetic underpinnings that link these films, we will delineate the savage from the civilized, the brute from the poet, the sacred from the profane and, indeed, the beauty from the beast. So beware as the beast has many guises.

Butch Epps recevied his MFA from the UCLA Department of Film and Televisions Independent Producers program where he focused on story development and working with screenwriters. Butch has taught over 30 film appreciation courses in the Coachella Valley for 9 years while developing a book - his magnum opus - on Orson Welle's Mercury production of Citizen Kane. Anne Applebaum warns her readers about the seductive lure of authoritarianism in her text, Twilight of Democracy. Based on these and other scholarly sources, this course will explore and ask the question: "Is democracy in retreat both here and abroad?"

Stephen G. Harding, MPA, is a former policy and management advisor to local and regional government. He is a retired instructor of global metropolitan policies in the Master of Public Policy and Administration program at Northwestern University. He currently serves as a Vice President of the Riverside Philharmonic and as a Member of the Board of Directors of the Wolfgang Wolff Foundation, dedicated to preserving the art and life history of Wolfgang Wolff, an exile of Nazi Germany. Since the Industrial Revolution, businesses and society have had to transform their models and practices to address the force of change. Early on, the force of change was more predictable and had a longer window to address its impact on the disruption it would cause. We are now reaching a stage where these forces are inexplicably interrelated and, hence, more difficult to plan and adopt. Each disruption alters multiple socio-economic models and requires the creation of new ones.
