





UCR Zoom: Iran-Contra: Whitewashing of Ronald Reagan

Nearly 40 years ago, a covert and illegal operation to arm a Central American insurgency and supply weapons to Iran during its war with Iraq exploded into global headlines. This six-session, 12-hour course traces the scandal from its early roots and political maneuvering through the dramatic cover-up by the Reagan administration, which shielded the president from impeachment, to its controversial conclusion when another president—himself implicated—pardoned those involved. Through lectures, discussions, and curated video segments, we'll examine pivotal moments such as the "October Surprise," the workings of "The Enterprise," media and congressional responses, and the political fallout that reshaped public trust. Participants will gain a deeper understanding of the political, legal, and ethical stakes of one of the most notorious chapters in modern American history.

Escape the holiday madness with three inspiring films you may have missed, each followed by a thoughtful discussion. The Miracle of the Bells (1948) tells the story of a press agent (Fred MacMurray) who returns the remains of an unknown actress (Valli) to her coal-mining hometown while trying to convince a Hollywood studio head (Lee J. Cobb) to release her only film. The Finest Hours (2016) recounts the true story of a daring Coast Guard rescue off Cape Cod after two oil tankers are destroyed during a 1952 blizzard. Joyeux Noel (2005), nominated for Best Foreign Language Film, portrays the unofficial Christmas truce of December 1914, when soldiers from opposing sides of World War I briefly set aside the conflict to share in each other's humanity.

Writer Carlos Fuentes once described Mexico's history as "a chronicle of constant struggle." In this six-week course, we'll explore major conflicts of the 19th and 20th centuries—from grappling with the legacy of 300 years of Spanish colonialism, to battles between liberal and conservative forces, to confrontations with U.S. power. Topics include the U.S.-Mexican War (1846–48), the French occupation of the 1860s, the impact of foreign investment in the late 19th century, the Mexican Revolution (1911), the 1938 nationalization of the oil industry, and the 1968 student protests in Mexico City. While not a full history, this course offers a vivid introduction to the pivotal events that have shaped modern Mexico.

Signature Rocks: Emigration and the Signed Landscape in Indian Country 1830-1869

Signature Rocks is the first systematic study of the surviving "signatures" inscribed by the emigrants, as they called themselves, on both the famous and not so famous rock formations that line the overland trails through Indian Country from the Missouri River to the Pacific from the 1830s to 1869. Once numbering in the hundreds of thousands, only several thousand have survived. Following the overland crossing, we read these inscriptions—an unrecognized and vanishing American archive—in light of a number of motivations to signing culled from the over two thousand emigrant journals and other accounts that have come down to us.
